

MathsOnline

All Year 7 to 10 students at Rouse Hill High School have access to MathsOnline, which is provided by the school. This is an opportunity for students to utilise the online program to support their learning of mathematics.

The program provides online tutorials in the form of animated videos showing examples of the concept. Following each maths tutorial, there are interactive questions and printable worksheets which test the understanding of key concepts. Answers are entered into the automated MathsOnline marking system which then stores the results in each individual student's ongoing progress report. Teachers can then view this report and tailor the teaching and learning experience for individual students.

Teachers at RHHS utilise this program to set class and home learning tasks. These tasks can be differentiated for individual student needs. Teachers can track the progress of these tasks by receiving information on results, completion rates and how many attempts a student makes on each task.

We would appreciate parent support in encouraging their child to use MathsOnline at home. They can even use the program to practise skills such as times tables and basic arithmetic.



All students involved had a great time and are now ready to take on any First Aid situations they may face. We would like to thank RLSA and PDHPE staff for facilitating this course.







Stage 6 Investigating Science and Stage 5 Zootopia Excursions

Stage 5 Zootopia

The Zootopia elective course allows Stage 5 students to explore areas that interest them in the fields of zoology, biology and environmental science.

Year 1.0 Zootopia students recently travelled to the Sydney Zoo at Bungarribee to observe exotic and native animal species, and prepare for their research project into animal behaviour. Students were most impressed by the lion group, four brothers who displayed social behaviours to maintain their tight family bond, and the meerkats, who showed us how they work together to protect against invaders. Discussions were extended to the classroom, where students considered the differences between animal behaviour in the wild and in captivity.







Stage 6 Investigating Science

Our field study to the Brewongle Environmental Education Centre took our students out of the classroom and onto the Hawkesbury River. After a Welcome to Country and a quick bush walk, the Investigating Science students were treated to a range of water testing techniques. This was not only done on the (not yet flooded) banks of the river but samples and data were also taken from their kayaks! Despite some students' best effort, Mr Dailly remained unsinkable in his kayak for another year.

Students were then able to investigate their samples back at the Education Centre and compare with a huge range of data from other schools. Finding and identifying a range of algae and other microscopic organisms proved to be enjoyable, particularly when given such creative new classification names by the class.

Stage 6 Industrial Technology Timber

The Stage 6 Industrial Technology Timber class have recently completed their Preliminary practical task, which was to design and construct a timber bedside table whilst meeting specific criteria. The students all successfully completed their projects with some pleasing final designs. Some valuable skills were developed in effectively using a variety of tools and machinery for the construction.

Students also investigated a business within the timber industry. They were required to either interview a business person or research a variety of factors online that are relevant to the industry. Some areas of their research included: organisational structure of a business, job description of employees, technical factors of day to day operations and environmental issues related to the business.


We were pleased to have a wonderful positive outcome with many students and teachers engaging in these stalls and activities and are looking forward to next year's Harmony Day!

At Rouse Hill we provide opportunity for ambitious students to challenge themselves academically both within and outside the normal school curriculum.


One way that we do this is by supporting students in participating in external academic competitions at various points throughout the year.



The Australian Geography Competition, challenges student knowledge and skills in geography, with high achievers winning prizes and the chance to represent Australia in the the International Geography Olympiad. We have a strong track record of high performance and we look forward to seeing our 2021 students shine.







The Australian History competition, for students in Years 7-10, is tied to the National Curriculum and offers students a challenging and exciting way to extend their learning beyond the classroom. Entries have now closed, but we trust our students will do us proud in the competition next term.

The AMT and ICAS will this year both be held in Term 3, with registrations closing in Term 2.



The AMT (Australian Mathematics Competition) is a popular and engaging 30-problem competition that tests the boundaries of your maths abilities.

Advanced English Sydney Jewish Museum Incursion

On Wednesday 6th March, students of Advanced English participated in a workshop run by the Sydney Jewish Museum regarding the treasured stories of the Holocaust and its survivors. Students critically explored the successes and weaknesses of texts in documenting the past, such as 'The Boy in the Striped Pyjamas' by John Boyne and 'Life is Beautiful' directed by Roberto Benigni. Students found it interesting to discuss the meaning behind specific literary details with our presenters, whilst reflecting on their purpose in portraying unique perspectives on the Holocaust.

A highlight of the event was the chance to listen to the story of special guest; Mark Spiegelman, Holocaust Survivor. Students were captivated by his story of survival and the traumas Spiegelman faced growing up in occupied Poland. The unique life of our special guest brought a new meaning to the word 'hope', with many students finding themselves comforted by Spiegelman's positive outlook concerning the past.

Our audience was surprised to learn that his survival story is featured in the graphic novel, 'Maus' by Art Spiegelman - available in the library. His answers to the group's questions did much to cheer up the room as his humour shined through the wounds of his childhood.

As a result, the Senior Advanced English students took away many notes for their assessment task on 'Narratives that Shape Our World', whilst being reminded of the resilience of survivors and their stories.


Book Corner!


Looking for something different to read?

Premier's Reading Challenge

The Premier's Reading Challenge is an annual extracurricular opportunity for students in Years 7-9 to sow the seeds of a life-long love of reading while receiving the benefits of reduced stress, increased literacy, and boosted capacity for memory and sustained concentration that come with regular reading.

The rules of the challenge are fairly straightforward. To complete the challenge and receive an award, a student must:

- Read 20 books between September 2020 and August 2021
- 15 of these books must be from the approved PRC list (available online)

There exists a clear correlation between a student's reading habits and their overall literacy skills. Though aside from this, the well-proven benefits that come along with the ability to read for sustained periods of time are such that I wish for all our students, and for that measure, our whole school community.

In terms of incentive, each student who completes the award receives a certificate of recognition, that can be used to demonstrate commitment, dedication, and zest for learning.

Special certificates are awarded to students completing the challenge for their 4th and 7th times, with gold and platinum certificates respectively. I'd like to take this moment to point out that many of our students are on the cusp of their next level and encourage them to take up the challenge this year.

For those rare students who are able to complete the challenge every year between Year 3 and 9, the Premier's Medallion is a prestigious and remarkable prize that you're eligible for.

A point-of-difference in 2021, coming as a result of the chaotic year that was 2020, sees the criteria for the challenge, and particularly for the medallion more accessible.

For the first time, students in Year 10 are able to participate in the challenge. If they would have been eligible to receive the medallion in 2020, they will receive it on completion of the challenge in 2021.

The Department of Education has set the target for students to

attend school 90% of the time.

When your student misses just one day every fortnight, they miss 4 weeks of school per year.

This is 6 months of schooling in High School or 1 year in their entire school life.

Attendance has been proven to be one of most powerful predictors academic achievement and can have a dramatic impact on key milestones. including 9th grade NAPLAN achievement, high school graduation, and postsecondary persistence. Chronic absenteeism is missing 10% of school (or 18 days), regardless of the reason. This is why the Department of Education has set the target for students to attend school 90% of the time

All parents have dreams for their children and want the best for them. At Rouse Hill High School, we are here to support all parents in their children's learning and attendance.

Attendance Matters is our whole school strategy to promote awareness and action to improve attendance. From Term 2. information posts. interclass competitions, recognition awards and incentives will be promoted to create awareness regarding the importance of being here every day!
