## Year 8 Maths - Data Investigation Task




Students in Year 8 are in the process of finalising their group PBL task for the topic of Data. The driving question was 'Who are our Year 8 students and what do they like?

Students in Year 8 each completed a survey to collect data about their backgrounds, physical characteristics, home life and likes. They then sorted and organised the responses so they could present five different sets of data using a variety of graphs and tables. For some of those sets of numerical data, they also needed to calculate important information such as mean, mode, median and range. During Week 5, all groups will be presenting their findings to their class.

This task incorporated real life skills such as using data to convey concise information to the audience and working in teams to share ideas. It also provided an opportunity for students to demonstrate their understanding of various mathematical concepts in an interactive way. They learned more about the benefits of software such as Google Sheets as well as different functions on their scientific calculators.

### Year 9 Visual Arts

In Terms 1 and 2, Year 9 Visual Arts students have been exploring how cultural traditions, history, personal and shared experiences, and the world, can influence and inform our personal vision of what 'Cultural Landscapes' are. Students investigated world renowned Artists such as Sally Morgan, Tom Roberts and Howard Arkley and discovered how they chose to represent the Australian landscape and explored their practice while learning the techniques of Scratchboard Printing, Monoprinting, and Lino Printing.

Students were then asked to create a Body of Work that reflected their personal view and experience of what the Australian Cultural Landscape is, utilising all of the printmaking techniques studied in class. Students drew inspiration from the beach, the suburbs, the outback, the harbour and the city to create outstanding 2D and 3D artwork.



## Year 10 Visual Arts

In Terms 1 and 2, Year 10 Visual Arts students explored how Surrealist artists such as Salvador Dali and Rene Magritte harnessed the power of the subconscious, dreams, nightmares and imagination to create powerful and thought provoking art. Students then created their own 2D and 3D artworks using Surrealist techniques and practices to explore and represent their personal identity and unique story in the unit 'Private Worlds'.

Student's work was outstanding and sophisticated and was imbued with multilayered meaning that connected to student personal memory, experience and identity through the use of symbols using a wide variety of mediums and forms. Themes that students covered included time spent with family, playing games, communication, relationships with family and friends, sport, grief, gaming, walking a personal journey and making their own choices, and seeing the world as library full of open possibilities.



## Year 12 Photography and Visual Imaging

In Term 1, Stage 6 Photography students learned how to create traditional black and white photographs using Analogue SLR cameras and utilising the Wet Photography/Darkroom method in the unit Traditions and Conventions. Students explored the role and features of a camera and enlarger, various camera angles and camera shots, textural manipulation of images, how to develop negatives, contact sheets, sun photographs and create negative sandwiches.

As part of this unit students were required to create a photographic Body of Work that utilised a variety of photographic techniques studied in class while also creating a physically tangible word. The completed work reflected a high degree of technical accomplishment in Photography with themes exploring leisure, food, apparel, and colours.





## Year 8 Science & Stage 6 Biology

**Stage 6 Biology** have been busy starting their Year 12 HSC course this term. They have been learning about how cells divide to ensure living things can grow, repair and reproduce. Integral to the healthy functioning of our bodies are mitosis and meiosis, two processes our students have been learning in depth. Students got hands-on to create colourful models to apply their understanding of many stages of these complex processes.

Developing and building models is a key skill in science, and Biology students welcomed the practice in preparation for their upcoming first HSC assessment task where they are to make models of DNA synthesis and present to a panel of their teachers.





**Students in Year 8** continued to learn about the human body this term. To demonstrate their understanding of our many body systems and the connections between them students were tasked with creating a storybook aimed at primary school students. Their stories had to include scientifically accurate text as well as illustrations that helped them to depict the parts of the body and how they work together to keep us alive.

The creativity displayed by our students was seriously impressive! Just as our body systems work together, the Year 8 students showed how science and creative writing can work together to create amazing works of art!

## Year 7 English: "Selling Stories"

Year 7 students have been developing their appreciation for the power of reading this term in English. After completing the "Building Connections Through Stories" unit in Term 1, where students experimented with creating connections through TED Talks and narratives, students have now turned their attention to inspiring teenagers (like themselves) to incorporate reading into their daily life. Students have shared with their classes a variety of texts that have impacted them. Among the favourites has been titles like "Harry Potter" by J.K. Rowling, "Diary of a Wimpy Kid" by Jeff Kinney and "The Hunger Games" by Suzanne Collins.

Students then considered the results of a study conducted by Deakin University into the reading habits of modern day teenagers. Some of the findings that Year 7 students found significant were that older students were more likely not to read daily than younger students, students indicated a preference for reading physical books and that the top barriers to reading were the difficulty of choosing a good book (61% of respondents) and lack of free time (56%).

Despite being on the cusp of their teen years, many students resonated with the challenges of maintaining a love for books and reading as they got older and could see evidence of these statistics in their own lives. Students have also reflected on the value of continuing to read, even when good books can seem far and few between and life is increasingly busy. Students learned that the average CEO reads a book a week and agreed that reading was crucial for developing their vocabularies, supporting their writing skills and fuelling their imaginations.

To share their appreciation of reading with their peers, students created posters that promoted the value of reading to a teenage audience. Year 7 agreed that reading opens young minds and sets us up for success. The next time you meet a Year 7 student, be sure to share with them a book that impacted you, to keep the inspiration going!







## English Extension 1: Independent Research Project

The Preliminary English Extension 1 course is a rigorous course designed to provide students with opportunities to extend their use of language and self-expression in creative and critical ways.

A significant component of the course is for students to undertake an intensive independent research product and present a multimodal presentation to report on their findings.


