# U/15 Girls Basketball Team Competes in the Final 16 of NSW



Recently we have spoken about the U/15 Girls basketball team who were successful at the Sydney West Carnival, finishing as runners up. This qualified them for the NSWCHS U/15 Girls basketball competition which led to a lot of fast planning by Mr Medcalf and Mrs Abbass to organise a quick trip to Ballina for a basketball game.

On Wednesday 14 September the team travelled to Ballina to take on Ballina Coast High School in the Final 16 of the state. The winner would go on to play in the NSWCHS Final 8 tournament early in Term 4.

The RHHS team met at school at 4:30am to catch an airport transfer for a 7:05am flight to Ballina. Weary eyed, the girls were all on time to catch the bus and we set off. We arrived at the airport with plenty of time before take-off and grabbed a quick bite to eat. Like most flights, ours was delayed but we still had plenty of time to spare.



#### **Jersey Day**

On Friday 2 September, Rouse Hill High School joined numerous schools across New South Wales in supporting organ donation by wearing a jersey to school. Jersey Day revolves around the act of students, staff and the general public to spark a conversation regarding organ and tissue donation with their loved ones, an initiative started by Nathan Gremo who gave the gift of life to six people through organ donation at the age of 13.

On Jersey Day, students and staff wore their jerseys on top of their uniform. Not only were they showing their support for their favourite soccer, basketball or footy team; they were also supporting Nathan and the cause he brought. Through the simple act of wearing a jersey on the day, the message of organ donation awareness was spread throughout the Rouse Hill community.

Throughout the past decade the number of donors has more than doubled with 554 in 2018 compared to 247 in 2009, thanks to the generosity of 463 deceased organ donors and their families. Through initiatives such as Jersey Day, the number of donors and lives saved will only grow.

#### Wear It Purple Day

Wear it Purple was celebrated at Rouse Hill High School on 26 August 2022. Students responded to the day positively and contributed by wearing purple accessories and getting rainbows painted on their face during recess. Leading up to the day, students were made aware of what Wear it Purple was through the use of a Kahoot. They were also told how to contribute if they wished to do so. Informational posters were hung around the school regarding more resources about Wear it Purple, and different types of pronouns that individuals in the LGBTQIA+ community may be referred to as.

Upon arrival at school, students were offered purple ribbons and stickers with the Wear it Purple logo. There was music playing and a rainbow poster at lunch where students added their name to show support. The music and rainbow poster were accompanied by face painting which was run by some Year 10 leaders.

# Term 4 Reset: Starting with Uniform

As outlined in the Week 9, Term 3 weekly email communication there have been several recent incidents of disrespectful behaviour demonstrated by students towards teachers and each other. We are addressing this concern through a number of approaches starting with tackling the decline in the standard of uniform.

At the whole school assembly on Tuesday 22 September, the expectations about uniform were communicated to all of our Year 7-10 students. Please ask your child about what they remember from the assembly, particularly in regards to how uniform is important in conveying a positive image of themselves and our school, promoting respectful behaviour and as a safety requirement. To help us keep our students safe on our premises, from the start of Term 4, anyone out of uniform will be withdrawn from the playground during recess and lunch. Where possible, students will be loaned uniform, however, we ask for your support in ensuring that your child leaves home in school uniform. This is the first step in displaying respect towards school expectations and that of our broader community.

Hoodies will be confiscated from students for collection at the end of the school week. This has been communicated to students throughout this week.

If you are experiencing financial difficulties in purchasing correct uniform, please contact the school office for advice or assistance.


Over the last few weeks The Masters of Art Club at RHHS has been inundated with some amazing artworks entered for the 2022 Yearbook cover competition.



We look forward to seeing the Yearbook competition becoming a regular fixture event at Rouse Hill High School.








#### Career in Interior Design



According to the <u>Good Careers Guide</u>, Interior Designers design and supervise the construction or redevelopment of building interiors. Successful Interior Designers are creative and have an artistic flair, as well as having an aptitude for technical drawing and illustration. The Good Careers Guide goes on to state that 'Interior design requires an understanding of building construction, lighting, colour, and furniture. Interior designers may work individually as consultants or with a design group. They visit clients in their homes and offices, and can often work long hours, including evenings and weekends. They usually work for clients on an agreed fee basis.

To become an Interior Designer students must go on to further study after finishing Year 12. At the very least, a diploma qualification is required, but students can also study bachelor degrees in design, offered at numerous institutions.

## YouthRock 2022

In late July, I took Year 12 Music students Robin Kukk and Hayden Samuels to YouthRock, a department run school based band competition pitting bands from across NSW Public High Schools against each other, showcasing their amazing talents in songwriting and musicianship. The students thoroughly enjoyed the experience, having met famous band manager Gregg Donovan (current manager for Grinspoon and former manager for Muse). They gained useful insight in breaking into the music industry and created lifelong partnerships and collaborations with major industry personnel and other competing bands.






#### **Tournament of Minds**

**Stage 6 Biology:** Ms Gibson-Garside and Ms McPhie took the Stage 6 Biology class to the Museum of Human Disease at UNSW. They examined human specimens of various diseases and ailments and saw some exhibits about the history of medicine. The students loved the museum and got an insight into how diseases are diagnosed.

**Year 8 Fizzics Incursion:** Year 8 were treated to a Chemistry show showing various entertaining chemical reactions. These illustrated various chemistry concepts that were fun, challenging and sometimes messy! The students enjoyed the show and it inspired them to want to know more about Chemistry!











# Stage 6 English

**English Faculty** 

October 12 sees the beginning of HSC examinations for 2022, and as always, the first examination is English. On that day, our English Faculty will be seeing off 111 students across English Studies, English Standard, English Advanced and English Extension 1, to demonstrate the depth of their learning this year.



Over the last few weeks, we have been celebrating the achievements of all our students and preparing for the examinations. It has been a fantastic time of looking at the key skills and knowledge that they will need to succeed.

As students approach the examinations, here are a few study tips for them to remember:

- Revise your content, prescribed texts, selected quotations, techniques and analysis.
- Write, write, write! Timed paragraphs and responses are a must!
- Apply feedback from practice tasks and assessments.
- Create study cards to test your knowledge of the key analysis in each paragraph.
- Review language forms and features for Module C (Advanced and Standard).

We would also like to pass on some tips and strategies for managing time during the examinations:

- Know how much time you have for each section You can complete these sections in any order you choose, so if you know you're really good at one topic, you may choose to try and complete that one in a little bit less time to give you more time on a topic you're less comfortable with.
- Make the most of the reading time Your reading time is usually only 5 minutes (10 in some exams like English Paper I). When it comes to managing your time, use those first 5 minutes to read through the whole exam carefully. Here are some things that you can do during reading time to save yourself some time:
  - Start to think of or even plan your answers.
  - Pinpoint any topic or question that might be challenging and mentally prepare.
  - If you're given options, like there are two essay topics and you only need to pick one, make those decisions during reading time and commit to them.
  - Read over long questions and complicated instructions twice so you don't make a mistake in the exam that will cost you some precious minutes to fix up.
- Start with what you can do and come back to the rest You could come across a single question that has stumped you. Come back to those tricky questions at the end if you can, but the most important thing is to keep working through your exam.
- Practise, practise The most important way to improve time management is by practising! Practise managing your time under examination style conditions - it is just as important as practising how to respond to questions. It doesn't matter how perfect your essay is, if you can't write it in 40ish minutes under a bit of pressure, you won't be able to show this to the markers.

#### **End of Year Preparations**




#### Book Recommendation - Harry Potter and the Chamber of Secrets, Author: J.K. Rowling


