ARTEXPRESS showcases outstanding student artworks developed for the art-making component of the HSC examination in Visual Arts 2023. Our students attended a seminar where students from the 2023 HSC offered valuable insights and perspectives on how they worked through developing their HSC artwork. Louise Bourgeois' exhibition, known for its powerful and large-scale artworks provided a rich and thought-provoking experience.

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Senior Chinese Class Excursion to Chinese Gardens

Chinese Beginners and Continuers students went on excursion to the Chinese Garden of Friendship in Darling Harbour at the end of February.

They learned how Buddhist and Daoist philosophies have influenced the style of Chinese gardening and explored all the spaces within the garden. Each student also recited a pre-rehearsed Chinese poem in a location of their own choosing within the garden. The poetry recitation helped them refine their pronunciation and appreciation of the culture within Chinese language. Then the students practised their calligraphy by writing with water on the pavement.

Lastly, the students went to Chinatown for lunch and visited places within Chinatown to further explore Chinese culture. It felt like they had travelled to China, even though they were still in Sydney.







Science

Year 7 have had a great introduction to science this year learning all about working scientifically and the key skills they will use all throughout their high school years. Throughout Term 1 Year 7 students have participated in many exciting activities, including getting their bunsen burner license and making paper helicopters! Next term Year 7 will start their exciting journey into the world of Biology, starting the new topic of Cells and Classification. They will explore the world of all living things, from looking at the smallest bacteria through microscopes to classifying elephants and trees..

Journeying into understanding the human body, Year 8 science have started their exciting journey into Biology and Anatomy through their topic of Body Systems. From dissections to origami, students are gaining knowledge about how their own body works, and all the ways it can go wrong.

Students of Year 9 have begun exploring the world of diseases! Year 9 have just finished their last topic of Chemistry, where they studied radiation and debated the benefits and risks of nuclear energy. In their new topic, Monsters Inside Me, they will get the opportunity to grow microscopic organisms found all around them, participate in dissections, and learn how their own bodies work to fight infection. The Year 9 Marine and Aquaculture class were also in the lab this term, taking the opportunity to dissect a fish!

Year 10 is currently nearing the end of their journey in the world of energy and motion. Students learnt about how Newton's laws apply in the real world, creating TedEd talks on how these laws cause damage in a car crash. Some students were 'lucky' enough to use Van Der Graaf generators to experience an exciting shock!








Psychology

2024 has seen the introduction of a new Stage 5 elective in the Science faculty - Psychology! It is a beneficial addition to Stage 5 study, as it offers students rigorous learning opportunities to explore different perspectives and examine cases from history that show us what it is to be human.

This term students in Years 9 and 10 have been learning how psychologists apply their understanding of behaviour and the mind in treating individuals and groups. Their introduction to types of psychology culminated in their first assessment task, where they created posters on famous psychologists from the past. Each class then conducted a 'Gallery Walk' where students viewed their peers' work and collected information to build a timeline of the history of psychology.

Next term students will look deeper into the way psychological research is conducted, and begin to develop their own research project into human behaviour.









TAS - Year 9/10 Foodie Adventures

This term in Year 9/10 Food Technology we have focused our learning and practical skills on the foods that we eat and why. We have asked the question - What factors have led to Australia's Cuisine today?

Classes conducted an investigation into a country, its culture and the cuisine that have been traditionally consumed. Students had to learn about typical ingredients and flavours, special methods of preparation and cookery and famous dishes.

Their practical task was to take this knowledge and develop a recipe for a burger that was clearly influenced by these traditions. Cuisines chosen included German, French, Italian, Greek, South African, Mexican, Middle Eastern and Japanese. Each burger was to be styled and presented ready for a food magazine photoshoot. Look closely to see that not all burgers need to come on a hamburger bun.

This term saw the first Mock Trial run as part of our extra-curricular opportunities in HSIE. The students were fantastic in their roles, and although we didn't get a win in this round, the experience gained will make for a confident, skilled team going into next term. Two students have written about their experiences:

Hey, Sakchhyam here, and my role for the first Mock Trial was the solicitor. This prominent role helps the barristers object to the opposing side, in this case, the defendant, and prepares the court for possible cross-examinations. In preparation for Mock Trials, I read over the cases and found possible objections that may occur during witness statements, and listed ways to counter their objections. Furthermore, I provided invaluable assistance to our barristers by scrutinising the defendant's case and outlining potential objections. Although we had lost our case, we learnt many lessons based on how the court of law works, the quality of evidence supported needed to win a case, and working at a high achieving standard to meet the successful requirements on getting ready for Mock Trials.

Hello everyone, my name is Yuvraj and my role for the first Mock Trial was the second barrister. This empowering role cross-examines defendants, develops commissions of inquiry and finds alternative forms of dispute resolution. In preparation for Mock Trials, I analysed previous cases, found possible objections I may use during witness statements and memorised laws to counter their objections. Additionally, I memorised some tips that may assist me during the trials and thoroughly assessed the statement of claim to not miss any minute details, regarding the case. Despite our unfortunate loss, I learned many lessons including how the court of law operates, how to thoroughly cross-examine the opposition and how the standards are required to meet the successful requirements in preparation for the trials.




With the commencement of the Year 12 courses in Term 2, we see some changes to classes. For Mathematics Standard students, they will need to select the Mathematics Standard 1 pathway or the Mathematics Standard 2 pathway for Year 12. The main differences are as follows:


- Standard 1: Less content than Standard 2, slower pace of coursework
- Standard 2: More content than Standard 1 (including more challenging concepts), faster pace of coursework


Teachers will discuss course selection with their students, as well as recommend which course the student should proceed with, based on results and completion of set tasks. Students will be making their final selection at the start of Term 2, after the Final Year 11 exam results are released.


For some students in the Mathematics Extension 1 course, they can select to complete the Mathematics Extension 2 course, which begins in Term 2. Students should be discussing their options with their teacher.



What is a Construction Manager?

Construction Managers plan, direct and oversee all aspects of the building process – from planning and design to development, construction and the day-to-day operation of the job site. They coordinate architects, engineers, and contractors to ensure projects are completed safely, on time, and within budget.

What skills and strengths are needed?

Strong leadership and communication skills to effectively manage teams and stakeholders. A solid understanding of construction methods and materials, along with problem- solving abilities to address challenges that arise. Attention to detail and organisation skills are crucial for keeping projects on track.

What are the pathways?

It's possible to work your way up through experience and on-the-job training, however courses such as a Diploma or Bachelor of Construction Management are recommended.

Students in Year 7 to 10 are invited to participate in the 2024 NSW Premier's Reading Challenge.


If students wish to participate, the goal is to read 20 books before Friday 23 August. 10 books are to be chosen from the huge booklist and 10 books are of personal choice.
