What would compel fourteen students from Rouse Hill to venture forth into the depths of the Blue Mountains and traverse more than 24 kilometres of rough, steep terrain? In leaving behind the comforts of everyday life these students faced many challenges in pursuit of an adventure and recognition.

These students, drawn from years 9 and 10, have elected to attempt the Duke of Edinburgh's Bronze award. To receive this prestigious award, each student must complete several months of physical recreation, community service, skill development, and multiple challenging adventurous journeys.

On this journey, students are faced with physical and mental hardship. In an age of ubiquitous technology, that often meets our needs instantaneously, the task of journeying into the wild with only what you can carry provides students an opportunity to develop perseverance, resilience, perspective and teamwork.

The Duke of Edinburgh's Award is an international program aimed at developing well-rounded and highly capable young people across the globe. The adventurous journeys are integral in that students are forced to overcome challenges and find new reservoirs of courage and confidence.

To qualify for this journey, these students were required to complete numerous training sessions covering everything from camperaft and pitching a tent, through to using a topographic map to navigate through national parkland, to leadership skills and teamwork.

To receive the bronze award, students must complete at least two journeys. Students attempting their 2nd or 3rd expedition serve as leaders to their journey team. On this hike, our students were ably led by Maanya P, Tian Yi WS and Glenn M.

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Senior Chinese students attend UTS debate on USA vs China: Who will dominate tech in the future?

Last Monday evening our Year 10 Elective Chinese students, together with Sophie P (HSC Continuers Chinese) and Madie C (2017 graduate Beginners Chinese) went to UTS Business School in the city to attend a special lecture about China's relationship with the US. The lecture was a debate on who would dominate the tech field in the future and the possible outcomes for the AI industry in Australia by 2050. It was hosted by the Australia China Relations Institute and chaired by former NSW premier and Australian Foreign Minister, Prof. Bob Carr, who is director of ACRI.

Our students were treated to front row seats and invited to be part of the Q&A on the issue. Our students were a great credit to our school and asked perceptive questions on various matters, such as which country would dominate tech by 2050, which country was more likely to be fund tech development in Australia in the future etc.

In light of the outcome of the recent G20 Summit, this debate was a timely discussion on China, Australia, US relations and the role that people with Chinese-speaking skills may have to play in business and government diplomacy.
















PDHPE- Yearly Wrap






Enhancing Secondary Research Skills in HSIE

These lists have been compiled by the Teacher-Librarian in consultation with teaching staff.


These lists will provide opportunity for students to consolidate and extend their learning in 2019.




A special commendation for a student




